Anna Campbell & Jill H. Casid

From the Series Public Sex / Public Gender: Art & Autonomy

Moderation: Marina Gržinić

In the lecture and workshop Jill H. Casid and Anna Campbell will present their artistic and theoretical work. One of the main proposals of the two authors to oppose institutional discrimination is to refuse the imposed heteronormative and binary views. This stance of refusal is presented through Casid's own production and Campbell's sculpture projects, and reflected through other trans*, non-binary, queer artistic positions and communities.

Anna Campbell's sculptures, installations, and ephemera mine history and queer desire. Campbell's work is in the collections of numerous universities as well as the MoMA Library, and their site-specific, bronze sculpture is permanently installed at the Lesbian Herstory Archives in Brooklyn.

Jill H. Casid is a theorist, historian, and artist Jill H. Casid holds the appointment of Professor of Visual Studies in the Departments of Art History and Gender and Women's Studies at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

<u>Marina Gržinić</u> is a full professor at the Academy of Fine Arts Vienna (since 2003), head of the Studio for Post-Conceptual Art Practices. Since 1982 work as a <u>video artist</u> in collaboration with Aina Smid. Marina Gržinić areas of specialization include contemporary philosophy, contemporary art, the study of coloniality and decoloniality, transfeminism, the analysis of racism, antisemitism, nationalism, and the study of memory and history in relation to resistance.

Lau Lukkarila

Hold your ache to my ache: movement practice

The workshop is an expanded social practice where festivities meet contemplation, politics, art and kinship. It consists of conversations, movement research, party songs and performative drafts. The workshop is formed through an interest in the presence of an emotional body in the act of dancing and performing. It is held in english and prior experience in dance or performance is not needed. Take comfortable warm clothes, notebook + pen, snacks and a water bottle.

Lau Lukkarila is a choreographer and performer born in Oulu, Finland, based in Vienna. Lau is interested in dedicated awkwardness and the presence of an emotional body in the act of dancing and performing. Between 2008–2013 they studied applied theatre, contemporary dance and performance in Metropolia University of Applied Sciences Helsinki and Royal School of Performing Arts in Madrid.

Ruth Jenrbekova was born in Almaty, Kazakhstan. She holds an MA in Urban Ecology, from the Biological Faculty of the Kazakh State University. Since the 1990s she is performance artist, educator, writer, and transgender activist, she is employed at the artistic para-institution named Kreolex zentre. Since 2017 she is a Phd-in-Practice candidate at the Academy of Fine Arts Vienna. The initial idea and the concept of the workshop were developed within the framework of the FWF-Projekts PEEK AR 567.
